Greetings, 79ers!

The post-reunion reports are starting to come in, and I have a

number of items to start this new year. So let's get right to it. First up this month is our Baja-racing surface warrior **Mike Shatynski**, who checks in from the west coast:

■ I was elected Chairman of the Board of the Battleship lowa Museum in the Port of Los Angeles in January 2018. According to TripAdvisor, lowa is now the 5th most popular tourist attraction (out of about 650) and 5th most popular museum (out of about 150) in Los Angeles. IOWA is not just a ship museum, her integral programs focus on three pillars; education, veterans, and community.

The big news - In January 2019, we were licensed by the Naval History and Heritage Command to become the National Museum of the Surface Navy. As of a few months ago, I became the Chairman of the Board of the National Museum of the Surface Navy at the Battleship Iowa.

We will build the museum aboard the ship so no need for a "brick and mortar" building. As a proof of concept, we have already cleared 7,000 sq. ft. of racks to install a new exhibit called "Lost at Sea" about Dr Bob Ballard's underwater discoveries. We will be clearing a total of 30,000 sq. ft. on the 2nd and 3rd decks of IOWA for the Surface Navy Museum.

We are building in 3 phases. Phase I is a move to a new slip as "anchor" for a redeveloped LA Waterfront in 2022, Phase II is the opening aboard IOWA in 2025, and Phase III will be a conference center ashore in 2030. We start our capital campaign next month to raise \$60M. We already have \$17M contributed to be a matching donation to get us to Phase I.

That is terrific news, Mike! Congratulations to you and your team on this accomplishment. I'll definitely look you up next time I'm in SoCal.
