LGen. L. F. Snowden USMC, Chief of Staff, Headquarters Marine Corps, expressed the regret of Gen. Louis H. Wilson USMC, Commandant of the Marine Corps, when he spoke to one of the largest meetings of the Annapolis Chapter of the Alumni Association on 14 February. Gen. Wilson was presenting the Marine Corps budget in Washington and sincerely regretted that he could not make the luncheon, but had a worthy representative of the Corps in LGen. Snowden. A veteran of 37 years in the Corps with 14 years service in Washington alone, LGen. Snowden assured his audience that the Corps was in good shape. As regards budgetary matters, Congress was checking carefully on fiscal responsibility, and the Corps was requesting some items that have been ignored or brushed aside as unimportant for the Corps' success in battle. Primarily among these is the AV-8B aircraft for VSTOL operations; if this advanced plane is denied the Marines, they will discard the Harrier aircraft.

Other machinery considered important are the LVA assault landing vehicle, at present available but at extremely slow speeds. The LVTX, an experimental landing vehicle, is still being worked on.

As regards personnel in the Corps, they are indeed an elite group. Over 80% of the enlisted members are high school graduates and the morale and production of the 189,000 strong Marine Corps will permit a lessening in numbers of the Corps, doing better with fewer. Recruiting has been a problem though and getting tougher as eligible men and women decrease with the population and as attractive of fers are made in civilian life for the type of person that the Corps is seeking. In addition there has been some resistance on the part of certain school officials who do not want their schools to be visited by any military organization.

The theory has been advanced that the Corps is an anachronism and that no amphibious role will be played in any future warfare. That this view is not universal is obvious in the fact that Gen. Wilson has just been made a full partner of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

LGen. Snowden indicated that the Corps has been fortunate in having as its Commandant Gen. Wilson, who will be transferred to the retired list in June of this year. In 1975 when Gen. Wilson came to the job, the Corps, and

all the military, were in a letdown after the Vietnam conflict. The tail end of the draft had maintained in the service many "antiestablishment" individuals who did not wish to conform to the system. On the theory that quality was a better standard than quantity. Gen. Wilson indicated that the dead wood would be removed, and 23,000 men were discharged from the Corps in one year. LGen. Snowden indicated that he did not wish to see a draft reinstated, but did feel that all 18-yearold men and women should be registered for service to the Nation, not necessarily in the military, but with a high priority for those that volunteer for this duty. Finally, he stated that the Corps has always recognized the fine quality of officer that the Naval Academy has furnished and will continue to furnish for the fu-
