VAdm. C.R. Bryan USN '45, Commander, Naval Sea Systems Command, was the speaker at the Chapter luncheon of the Annapolis group on 11 April at the Officers' and Faculty Club at the Academy. VAdm. Bryan, one of the three last officers on active duty to wear the submarine war patrol insignia from World War II, held his audience with an extremely interesting discussion of the labor situation in the construction, maintenance, and acquisition of ships, the contract problem, and importance of naval engineers in today's Navy.

As regards the labor situation, the pertaining conditions for naval vessels' overhaul and repair require division between private yards and naval shipyards, but construction of these ships has been permitted only in the private yards since 1967. The Naval Sea Systems Command, made up of the former Bureau of Ships and the Bureau of Ordnance, has about 100,000 people, mostly civilian, with 2,000 officers who are approximately one half line and one half EDO, SC, or JAGC. The naval shipyards employ about 66,000 people, whereas the
