it by crossing a flat bolder field, that may have also been a mistake due to the difficulty in negotiating the rocks and our (mine) level of fatigue from the day. Next day we hike back and we stayed with Mike near Salt Lake City. Had a nice steak dinner watched a movie, re-told old stories and went to bed. Randy left next morning then Mike and I continued hiking and climbed Mt Timpanogos. It was great to hike with Randy. He insists that Lew paid me to take him to get him out of Texas for that week because Lew was travelling through Texas at the time, not true."

Randy chimed in via e-mail that Herb and Mike are the experienced hikers, having summitted all the peaks along the Appalachians.
