

Greetings, 79ers!

I start this month with this appeal from our class president **Sean Cate**:

■ In the News section of our class website, www.usna79.com, there is information related to the Captain **Gerald F.**DeConto USN Veterans Memorial Stadium building in Jerry's hometown of Sandwich, Massachusetts. Jerry, who died during the 9/11 attack on the Pentagon, grew up in Sandwich, and played soccer at Sandwich High School. His family donated \$250,000 to the non-profit Sandwich Sports Complex Committee (SSCC) which was formed to raise funds to build the stadium.

The Captain Gerald F. DeConto USN Veterans Memorial Stadium opened on Thanksgiving of 2011. The SSCC, though, is still raising funds to add Grandstands, Press Box, Field Lights, Field Turf, and the Memorial Plaza that will include granite memorial benches, flags, a brick walkway etc. After consultation with the class officers, it was decided the class will support this project: specifically, the class will raise a minimum of \$12,000 for the Flagpole and Base stones in the Entrance Plaza. Our class (Jerry's class) will be suitably recognized for this donation.

If only 120 of us donate \$100 – the cost of one or two nights out on the town – we will have this licked in no time. If we can get 120 more such contributions, we can add on ten granite piers that will ring the Veterans Memorial Plaza. Any and all contributions are welcome. I also propose the option for any classmate to donate for this or for a granite bench (\$2K each), a football goal post (\$15K). Field Lights (\$300K), etc., and be recognized individually.

If your company matches charitable contributions, please let them know to match your offer. If your company would like to step up further, the SSCC is seeking corporate sponsors. The non-profit has been working hard to raise corporate donations but the sledding has been difficult! The Sandwich Sports Complex Committee (fund raising arm for the DeConto USN Stadium) is a non-profit and any donation is tax deductible. The SSCC has two methods of receiving donations and all donations will be acknowledged.
