Greetings, '79ers!

This has been one of those rare months when the mailbox is empty. I get it – holidays are over, days are short, and work is gearing up. I don't have any classmate news *per se*, but there is one item of note.

Last fall, class president **Sean Cate** represented us at the annual
Council of Class Presidents. As he
always does, Sean sent out a detailed summary of items pertinent
to '79 to the class email list. I don't
normally reprint those; however,
Sean did touch on one item that I

- reunion planning.

As most everyone is aware, Navy now plays football in the American Athletic Conference (AAC). One unanticipated consequence of this is the impact on planning for individual class reunions. Navy's football schedule used to be coordinated years in advance – therefore classes could choose their reunion dates and book hotels/venues 3-5 years before the event.

Not so any more. The AAC sets its schedule a mere 6-7 months prior to the start of the season. Only the non-conference games - Army, Air Force, Notre Dame, and the first game of the season - are set further

in advance. Navy still has an official "Homecoming" game (usually in October), but the opponent isn't released until the official AAC schedule is published. Hence the new challenge in reunion planning.

To counter this, classes are looking at all sorts of options. Some have selected a Spring Reunion date built around a lacrosse game. Others are having theirs in conjunction with the Notre Dame game (2019 will be at ND). One class just picked a fall weekend when the team was on the road – they "tailgated" at Navy-Marine Corps Stadium and watched the game on TV in the N-Star room (where we held our 35th Reunion).

For our 40th Reunion year, the only 2019 home game dates we know are September 7 vs. Holy Cross (the weekend after Labor Day) and Homecoming on October 26th. The question before the Reunion Committee is whether pick one of those dates; pick another weekend and take our chances with the schedule; hold the reunion at a different time of year; or look at other options. No final decision has yet been made, but as we learned Plebe Year, "time, tide and formation wait for no (reunion)."

This was the year for international travel experiences, with the first opportunity in Berlin, Germany in May. This was my first visit and our hotel actually straddled a line that represents where the Berlin Wall stood until 1989. We were not far from the Brandenburg Gate, famous for being in the background when President Reagan encouraged Gorbachev to "tear down this wall." We visited Checkpoint Charlie, the egress point for Germans to leave the West. There were many other wonderful sites to see, but the vestiges of the Cold War were particularly poignant to this Cold Warrior.

In June I flew to Istanbul for a 30-day excursion that ended in Amsterdam. We spent a couple of days in Istanbul visiting mosques, churches, palaces, and taking a cruise on the Bosporus. There was a bombing in the city while we were there; fortunately, we were about 5 miles away. We went into the countryside to see the ancient city of Troy and included the Trojan horse used in the recent movie. A major highlight of this portion of the trip was a visit to Gallipoli, a very famous World War I battle for the Australians and New Zealanders. Our tour company was from Australia and our traveling companions were mostly Aussies and a couple of Kiwis. Visiting Gallipoli with them was quite an honor (similar to them accompanying an American to Normandy) and we saw many of their family's names on the war memorials in the park.

From Turkey we traveled to Bulgaria and experienced the Bulgarian Orthodox churches complete with gold-leafed icons and a beautiful performance of the chants sung in their services. We toured the parliament building in Romania that is the largest building in Europe before embarking on a river cruise ship for 21 days. We cruised the Danube and visited Croatia, Slovenia, and Hungary. I fell in love with Budapest and can't wait to get back there. We also visited Austria and traversed the Main-Danube Canal, which had 64 locks that took us up to the continental divide before lowering us to the Main River. The Main took us through Germany, lots of towns with the medieval walls and cobblestoned cities. More castles, churches, palaces and beautiful scenery! We moved to the Rhine and finished our trip in Amsterdam. I enjoyed the luxury of the cruise ship where our "butler" took great care of us. Quite the magical vacation!

I continue to keep very busy with volunteer work. Through the credit union, I was able to visit Boston and take in a game at Fenway Park and see Big Papi hit a home run in his final season.
