# Operation Mobilization (OM)

Pat Tracy has been traveling the world for many years as a Merchant Marine. How did he get this opportunity for a second career after a 20-year career as

a Surface Warfare Officer, you might ask? As Pat recounts, "At the 16-year point (time to think about what I was going to do when I grew up), I arrived for Pentagon duty.

We found our church by finding a Christian school for our boys; at their Missions conference, I felt God tapping me on the shoulder. My response was, 'All I know about is



ships. What could I ever do?' There I learned about Operation Mobilization (OM) and Good Books for All (GBA), partnering to 'bring knowledge, help and hope to the people of the world'. Hearing of the great need, especially for qualified crew, our next step became clear."

Converting Navy qualifications to Merchant Marine certification is no easy task. Pat was required to pass the Chief Mate exam, which he did in two years by leveraging his previous education and experience just in time to transition from the U. S. Navy to his first GBA assignment. His second career began in September 1996, as his wife, three sons, and he joined MV DOULOS (at the time, the oldest ocean-going passenger ship in the world) in Hong Kong. He was initially 2nd Mate (Navigator), then Chief Mate. Since 1996, Pat has sailed around Europe, Asia, Africa and the Caribbean to carry out the GBA mission to thousands of visitors aboard OM vessels, where they see 400 young people from over 60 countries working together to bring good literature, energy and caring to their community. Over the years, it's been Pat's privilege to command DOULOS, LOGOS-II, and his current ship, the 12,500 GRT M/V LOGOS HOPE.

Pat remarks, "It is gratifying to see the changes in the lives of our volunteer crew. Very few come with sea experience, so we teach and train every day, 'building our own' Able Seamen, Motormen, and Lifeboat Crews. In short order, they find themselves excelling at things they never imagined doing. Since I've been both training and now sailing as a reliever (standing in for the C/M or Master for months at a time) it's gratifying to see the growth in confidence, seamanship and life skills. As you may imagine, Port States are intrigued by our all-volunteer and in-house trained crew; they are good at what they do, and like many sailors, enjoy the opportunity to demonstrate what they've learned."

Although they shared progressive pedigrees, each culture embodied a distinctive vision for the Navy's future". Sounds like a great, well thought-out read.
